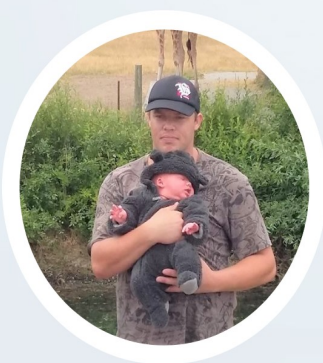

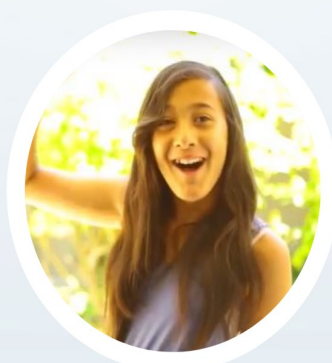
## What do we do?

# Executive Director's Report

What's in a name? To us, the name Home & Family has great significance. As a charity that was formed over 120 years ago, it gives us a link to our past and the mahi that has supported our community over the decades. Starting off as *The Society for the Protection of Women and Children* in 1893, our name was changed to *The Society for Protection of Home and Family* in 1955 and shortened finally to *Home and Family Society* in 1981. As well as being a link to our past, the name Home & Family also defines what values sit at the core of our organisation.

In the *Family and Whānau Status Report 2017*, Superu's research signals the need for whole of family responses that reflect families' histories, environments, circumstances and responsibilities; strengthen resilience to enable them to manage the various challenges that arise over time; and recognise the inter-connectedness between individuals and their families, and families and their communities. At Home & Family, we deliver family-focused, holistic, evidence-based services. Our mission is to provide environments for positive change and we are aware of the need to work with the whole family/whānau. The aim of our three services, Counselling, Parenting and Refocus is to assist parents and caregivers build safe and secure families. Our vision is that all children live in homes with whanau/family who cherish them, keep them safe and nurture their potential. As a team, we have also explored the notion of 'home', what it means to all of us as individuals as well as an organisation. Maya Angelou identified that 'the ache for home lives in all of us, the safe place where we can go as we are and not be questioned' I am sure all of you can identify where you feel most 'at home' and why it is so important.

Consistent with prior years, the full financial statements, including the auditor's report are published separately. The comparatives for the prior year are for a 9-month period, due to the change in balance date last year.

From a financial perspective, the year has seen three significant milestones:.

Firstly, we successfully negotiated a two- year service contract with

MSD, as against an annual contract in the past. This provides greater certainty of contract income through to June 2019. The income is paid annually in advance with the unearned portion at year end reflected in the balance sheet as a liability. The new contract provides an uplift in revenue from prior years, which is testament to the ongoing demand for, and effectiveness of, programmes being run by the Society.

Secondly, we have largely completed the Our House project which has demanded careful management of our cash flow. With the end now in sight we are confident that the many generous cash and in kind donations and grants pledged will be sufficient to fully fund the Project.

Lastly, we are delighted to have received a firm commitment from Dublin Street Charitable Trust to fully fund the Refocus programme through to the end of 2019.

The Society is reporting a surplus for the year of \$648,666, which is largely attributable to the donations and grants towards Our House. Total revenue amounted to \$1,822,132 while total Expenditure, including depreciation, amounted to \$1,173,466.

Excluding grants, donations and related expenses of the Our House Project, the Society reported a small loss at an operational level. One of the aims of the Society is to provide essential services at a level of fees which all clients can afford. This in turn creates the challenge to find funding to meet any shortfall.

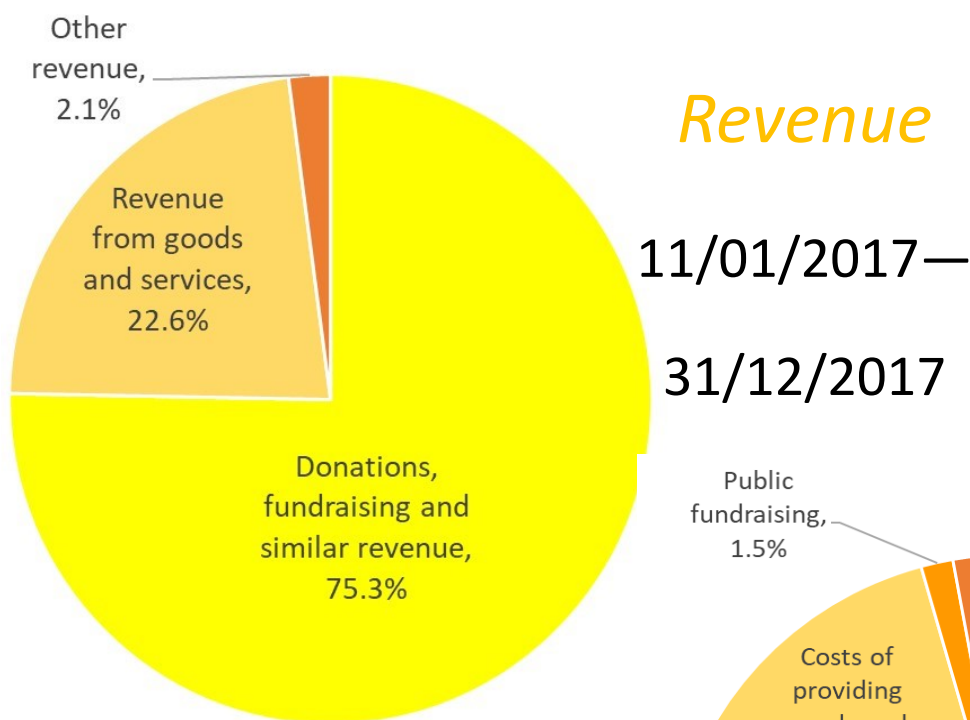

Looking forward, we are budgeting a breakeven result from operations for 2018 and anticipate meaningful savings and additional income arising from relocating to Our House.

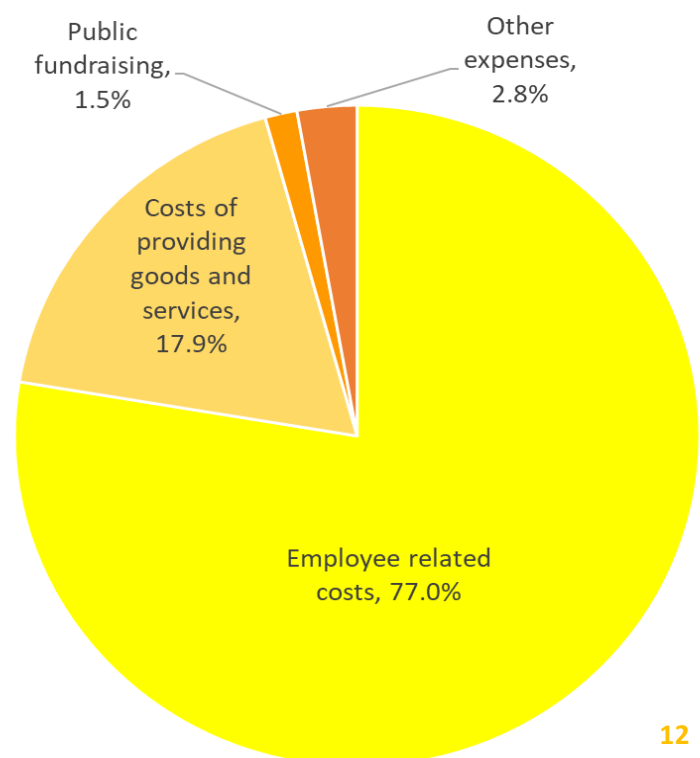
Below are two pie charts which summarise the revenue and expenses for the year. Donations, grants and similar revenue of \$1.372m account for 75% of total revenue, and revenue from services of \$412k accounts for 22.6%. By far our largest costs are employee related costs of \$913k, accounting for 77% of total expenditure, while costs of providing services of \$210k account for 17.9%.

We finished the year with cash on hand of \$497,488 and no bank borrowings. The Society has an undrawn loan facility of \$141,000 available to meet cash flow demands

# Counselling Team Leader's Report

2017 was once again a big year in the counselling team. The year began with some personal tragedy for one of our team which impacted us all but we continued to deliver professional counselling to our clients while supporting our own. It was heartwarming to see the care from the wider Home & Family team also – Home & Family modelling a family.

We have been able to offer counselling through a number of modalities including: Child Centred Play Therapy, Gestalt Psychotherapy, Emotionally Focussed Therapy, Person-Centred Counselling, Arts Therapy, and Solution-Focussed Brief Therapy.

When we look at our statistics for the year, we can take satisfaction in, once again, having helped a large number of clients, 362 this year! That is 362 children, youth and adults who have experienced significant emotional support.

The top five reasons children are referred for our support are the same as in recent years. However, this year, abuse and family violence has topped the list considerably. Anecdotally, we have noticed the increased complexities that clients are presenting with, as well as the trauma experienced through abuse and violence. Recent referrals from Canterbury's Integrated Service Response to Family Violence, and referrals from Refocus have also added a layer of complexity.

Changes within the team can be sad as people move on. However new people arrive and bring their fresh energy and enthusiasm which is welcome and infectious. We were sorry to see Sophie and David leave and valued the years of collective experience we shared, but are very happy to have some counselling students recently begin their placements. The wonderful counselling team making a difference in our community alongside me are Guy, Carolyn, Jocelyn, Gill, Arijana, Anna-Marie and Amy. You all bring passion, hope, persistence and professionalism to seek the very best outcomes for our clients. We are so thankful to those who continue to support Home & Family financially. Your part enables clients to access support and allows us to get on with our part.

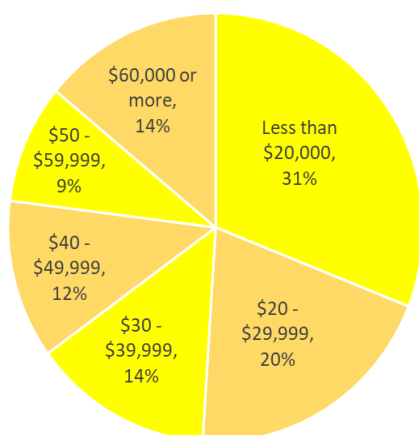

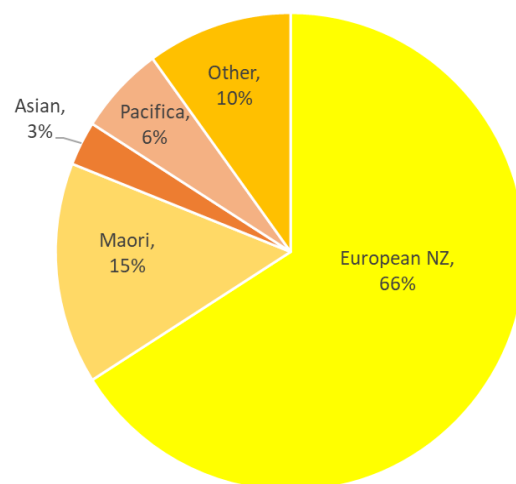

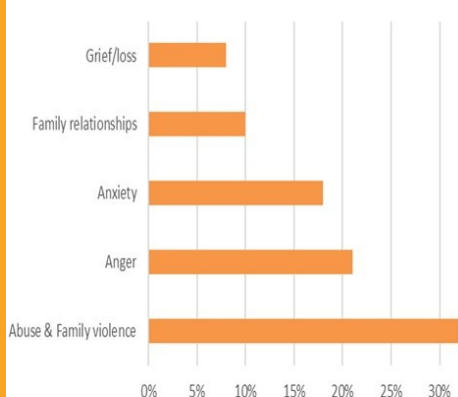

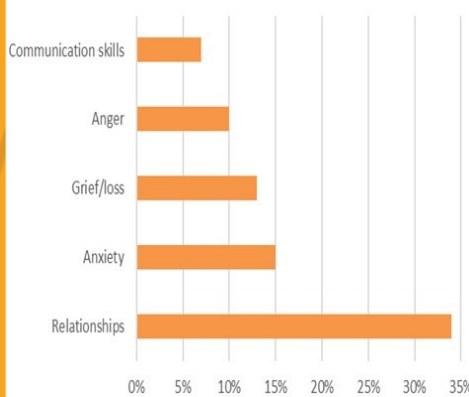

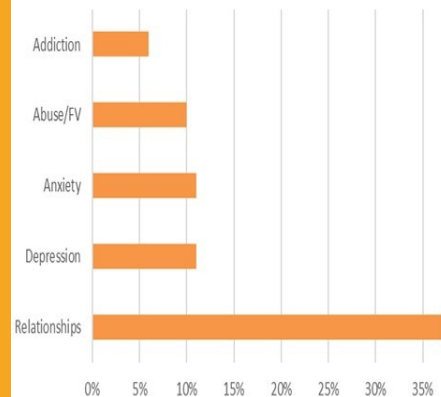
Top 5 referral reasons - children

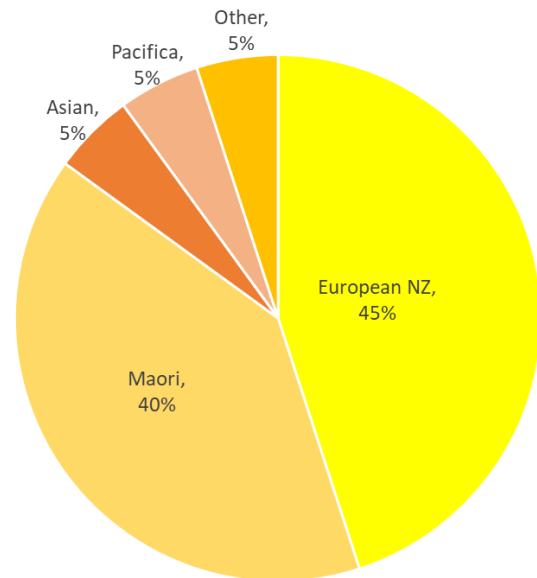

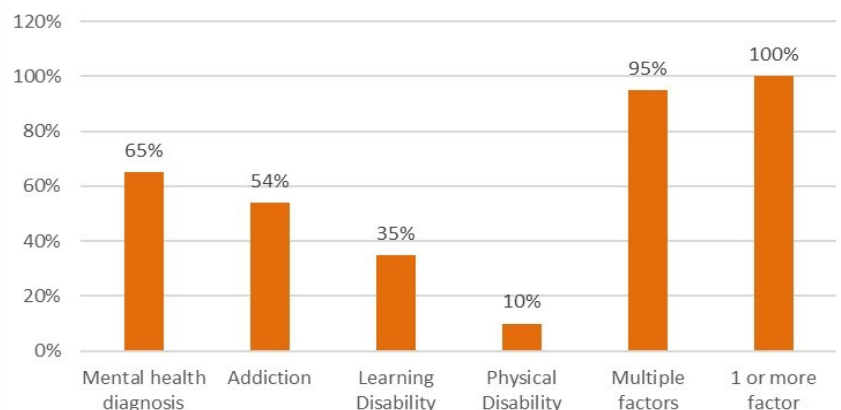

## Parents living with...



Refocus is a child-centred intervention, which aims to break the cycles that can result in young people entering the youth justice system. The programme is a holistic service that recognises how the 'bigger picture' contributes to young individuals becoming offenders. Much research has been undertaken, which looks into the efficacy of different types of intervention for young people at risk of (or who already are) offending.



As a team, we work with the whānau and their tamariki for up to five years, with Te Whare Tapa Whā underpinning planning for our work. We look at how the 'bigger picture' contributes to the actions of our young people. Kaimahi whānau (family workers) and kaimahi rangitahi (youth workers) ensure there is an effective level of support in children's education, home, community, mental and physical health. We strengthen and create ties to building a better home for our young people and parents.

*"Families need to be supported to build strong relationships and relational resilience within the family as a functional unit" - Superu, 2017*

Last year, we supported over 20 whānau, one third were new to the programme. The average age of a referred young person was 10. Six in ten referred young people had siblings with whom kaimahi rangitahi also worked. All referred children had experienced family violence and family offending.

In 2017 our team saw major change and there are now 4 of us, all working full time. As well as Team Leader, my role is kaimahi whānau, along with Kevin Hapi. Zenn Rarere and Hunia Waenga are our kaimahi rangitahi. I would like to thank all of the team for their dedication and supporting in building healthier tamariki and whānau, which of course without a doubt builds healthier homes within our community.

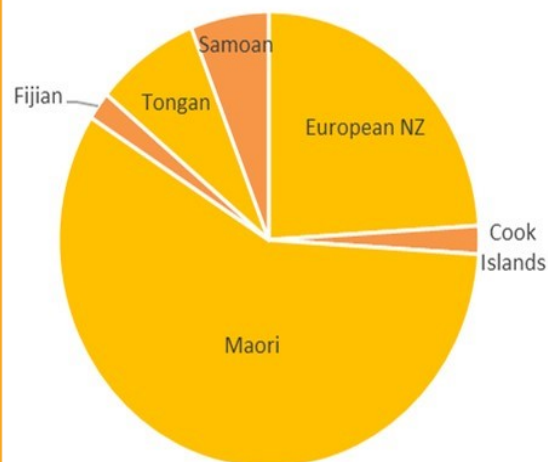

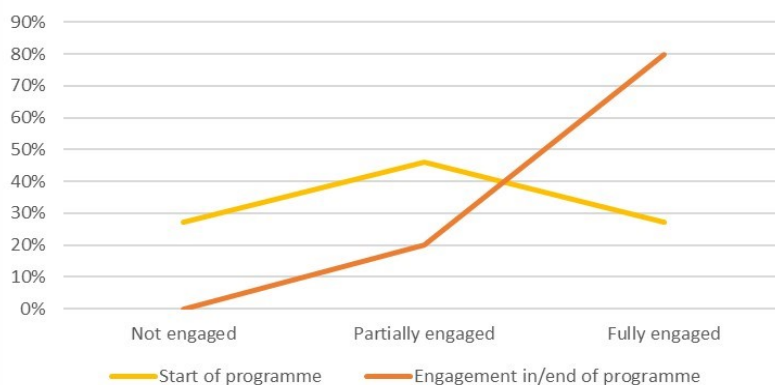

# Ainsley's Story

I am an addict. I am in the midst of a psychotic break. I am homeless; my son has been out of my care for 6 months. I am 28 years old. I am dying...

My name is Ainsley, I am 43 years old, and it is time to share part of my story so others can be helped as my son and I were. It is time to give back.

In desperate need of housing, my son and I were offered accommodation at Home & Family's residential home. I turned up on their doorstep child in hand, completely destitute and broken. That first door that was opened to me was to open many more doors along my journey with Home & Family. Had I known that my walls were to give way to my truth, I may have run. Knowing I was going to have to face my demons would have petrified me. But eventually facing them has set me free.

Home & Family not only offered my son and I a roof over our heads, they offered me the opportunity to face my addictions, to understand my mental illness, to face my demons in a safe supported environment; but ultimately they gave me the belief that, yes I am a loving caring mother who loves her son unconditionally and would do anything to protect him. That was the best gift anyone could give me.

Today my 19 year old son is an amazingly balanced and beautiful young man. A testament not only to my care, love and protection for him, but also a reflection of Home & Family's commitment to not let us slip through the cracks in a fractured system. The rest of my son's experience is his to share when he is ready.

It is very clear to me without Home & Family's support 15 years ago and their staying in my life over the last decade as I needed additional support along the way, I would not be the woman I am today: sharing with you my survival story. For that is what this is - a story of survival, a story of a woman found, a story of a mother who was given the chance to be the mother her son could be proud of, a mother who has battled her demons and won. A mother who just is.

These days a sunrise is a mesmerising beauty, a sign of life, as opposed to an alarm clock telling me I've survived another day.

I don't want this to simply be a plea for funding. It is more about the community having an awareness of the vulnerability of mothers, fathers and children within our society. Those that need the help and support to change and to break the cycle of abuse and neglect that many of Home & Family's clients have unfortunately experienced themselves throughout their own childhoods. Home & Family supports parents to make safe and positive changes and rely on funding and donations to continue this much needed service. If Home & Family had not been available 15 years ago to support me and my son I truly believe I would not be standing here before you sharing my journey.

My name is Ainsley. I am alive. I survived. I won. My son won. I am giving back.
